<sup>1</sup> Anthropology and CFM courses that meet CATC tags (with max of 3 from major counting for Christ at the Core Thematic Core): ANTH 118 (SI), ANTH 116 (GP, SI), ANTH 351 (GP, HP), ANTH 353 (DUS, GP), ANTH 431 (GP, SI), ANTH 435 (GP, HP), SOC 383 (AAQR), CFM 223 (SI), and CFM 335 (LE)

<sup>2</sup> While the department strongly recommends all ANTH-CFM students complete a Cultural Immersion Experience, for this integrated major, students may elect to do an internship in ANTH or CFM instead of the Cultural Immersion Experience. Many students choose to do both an internship *and* the cultural immersion experience, often at the same time in the case of the HNGR program, Wheaton in Chicago, and with many other semester-long, off-campus programs. For ANTH-CFM students choosing the ANTH 331 option, ANTH 331 is a 0-credit, transcribed course that can be registered for during the semester the student is doing the program, such as Wheaton in Mexico, HNGR, Wheaton In Chicago (WIC), Semester in Jerusalem or Prague, or Uganda Studies Program.

<sup>3</sup> Students may take anthropology and Christian Formation and Ministry elective credit *any* semester. Most study abroad programs include courses that are focused on the cultural context of the program's location, and those are usually transferred to Wheaton as ANTH credits. Up to EIGHT (8) credits from an off-campus program may be part of the required SIXTEEN (16) elective credits.

<sup>4</sup> Students need 16 credits of CFM courses, 8 of which must be at the 300-level or higher.

<sup>5</sup> We strongly recommend ANTH majors have some exposure to the biblical, philosophical, and theological discussions around human origins. Many courses in the SIP thematic core tag provide this exposure. The Anthropology faculty recommend ANTH majors meet their SIP thematic tag (and potentially the PI or HP tag, depending on the course chosen) with either SCI 301 (Fall only), SCI 302, SCI 311 (Spring only), or SCI 303.

<sup>6</sup> ANTH-CFM students have the option of SOC 353, HNGR 385 (HNGR students only), or CFM 494. As CFM 494 serves as the capstone course for CFM majors, we highly recommend students do not take this course prior to their junior year. SOC 353 is only taught in the Fall, and HNGR 385 is only Spring and is only available to students earning the HNGR Certificate. SOC 353 meets the AAQR tag and is the recommended course for ANTH-CFM majors. Students wishing to take CFM 494 and another course in this category may count CFM 494 toward the CFM elective credit total.

<sup>7</sup> As an integrated major, ANTH-CFM requires a course to bridge the disciplines. Approved courses are ANTH 351, 353, 354, 451 and SOC 366. Occasionally a course within ASUS or CFM will be offered that meets the criteria for a course connecting ministry, society, culture, social structure, and theology. If a student believes a particular course not on this approved list would meet those criteria, we will consider a departmental recommendation for inclusion of that course as the Bridge course.
