¹ Courses that meet CATC Thematic Core tags: URBN 114 (GP, SI), URBN 233 (DUS, SI), ENGW 233 (LE), PSCI 324 (DUS, PI), and BITH 339 (PI), all of which are offered during the Wheaton in Chicago semester (see footnote 5), *except* URBN 114.

² If you plan to participate in WIC your second year, you must take either the OT or NT prerequisite during your first year to take BITH 376 Theologies of Transformation during your WIC semester.

³ Research and Design course can be met with either ANTH 482^S or SOC 482^S. Can be taken during year 2 or year 3, but it is best to take it in year 2, preferably prior to the WIC semester. Generally, SOC 482 and ANTH 482 are Spring courses. NOTE: Students should anticipate taking the senior Capstone in the discipline in which they took methods. (e.g., SOC 482 students should take SOC 494).

⁴ URBN majors are required to take 8 elective credits. These courses will bring the total number of major hours to 36. See the college catalog for the full list of courses that are URBN major electives.

⁵ Wheaton in Chicago (WIC) program may be taken in almost any fall or spring semester. The usual sequence suggests that students take URBN 114 and either the OT or NT prerequisite for BITH 376 prior to WIC. **URBN 399 (0 credits) is always taken the semester prior to WIC (see footnote 6).** Students can also participate in more than one Wheaton in Chicago semester, if interested, and should discuss the possibility with program staff for further details.

Additional URBN courses available during WIC are listed by semester below. Major courses BITH 376 (which is in place of BITH 315 in the CATC Shared Core) and URBN 233 are ONLY available during WIC. All internships/practicum may be taken for URBN major credit, and they may be taken for completion of internship credits in another academic department as well (see the other academic department for additional internship requirements). Please note that the course offerings are flexible, and this is a guide, not a guarantee of course offerings for WIC.

⁶URBN 399 must be taken in the semester before the Wheaton in Chicago term. For students participating in WIC in the Fall, it is a summer course. For students participating in WIC in the Spring, it is a B-Quad Fall course.

⁷URBN majors must take the capstone course for either Anthropology (ANTH 494) or Sociology (SOC 494). The choice of capstone course depends on which Research and Methods course you take (ANTH or SOC 482).
