The 2022 Europe Tür, meant to be Dr. Hopper's final sendoff, was canceled. That fall, we were incredibly fortunate that Dr. Blackstone stepped in as our new director. Still, this meant an uphill battle for the cabinet as we both had to help New Men and our director learn our traditions. Through it all, the Glee Club sang on. We sang masked when required, put together a Tür to South Carolina and Georgia, and put on a banquet 95 floors above the Chicago skyline.

Blair Carlson: One Small Step

My older brother sang with MGC when he was a student at Wheaton and he insisted that I audition when I started in August of 1970. Somehow waiting in Pierce Chapel to go in for the audition I met Michael Linton, also a freshman, and as a composition major in the Conservatory he knew his way around. Our lifelong friendship began that day as he must have noticed I was nervous and gave me the best advice ever, "Just belt it!" Needless to say, somehow, I got in and became a second tenor.

Almost straight away, as an art major, I got involved in silk-screening T-shirts for the MGC intramural teams, and helping with set design, etc. for our home concerts. It must have been through these connections that at the end of my sophomore year I was nominated and elected to join the Cabinet and serve with President Curt Almquist as Business Manager for my junior year 1972/1973. The position would entail working on the long and the short US concert tours, organizing local Sunday night concerts, and planning the scheduled European tour in the summer of 1973. For this, I was connected to Dr. Cording. We became a team to prepare the summer concert schedule for a number of countries. And I would be the legs man and point person on the tour itself.

This is all a back story to say this. I was seriously dyslexic growing up. Schooling was big trouble for me as I did not learn to read until I was 12. I attended a British primary school in the former British Colony of Hong Kong. Neither my teachers nor my parents really understood what was going on and why learning to read was so hard. Even though they knew I could not read they still kept advancing me year by year and my teachers would still call me up to the front of the class to read sections of the books just like the other children – which I couldn't do. So I was kind of shamed in front of my classmates, although I could not have explained this feeling then. But as a result, I hated standing in front of anyone, anytime, for any reason.

Fast forward to serving as the MGC Business Manager for the year. My first job was to stand and tell the men what time the bus would leave Pierce Chapel on a Sunday afternoon. It was only to announce the day and the time and the place of the church concert. But I was scared to death. To me, it was like giving a major speech live on TV with a vast crowd watching. I was energized by the work of organizing. I enjoyed the details of the tours/concerts. That was not the issue. It was the announcements that were terrifying. I never told anyone, and no one commented that I seemed nervous, that I can remember. The point is to say that God used that position and that small step to push me forward. I think He must have organized this first step to help me get over my fear of standing up front and opening my mouth.

Today I am the minister of a small Anglican Church plant here in Minneapolis. Prior to this, for over 26 years, I worked with Billy Graham arranging his missions in various cities around the world. The work of both entails standing up in front. So, for this article, I want to thank God for using MGC in such an unusual way. As I look back, I give thanks to my brother who encouraged me to join. I am thankful to Michael Linton for the timeliness of his advice. I am thankful for whoever it was who put my name forward for business manager. I loved the singing. I treasure the friendships formed. I was challenged by the work. But I am most impressed by a faithful God who so graciously found a way to provide healing, beginning with that one small step of standing up and telling everyone the time the bus would be leaving.

Home Concert Reunions: Reflections (Cont.)

Coming to Wheaton in 1963 as a new freshman, I'd already been immersed in the Men's Glee Club following older brother Dave, a senior and an "old man" whom I'd seen on tours and at home concerts. Joining Men's Glee that first year rapidly affirmed that group as my "community" for the next four years.

Each of the ten tours I participated in during the following four years had distinctive impacts on my personal and spiritual growth. Still, that inaugural 1963 European tour was uniquely formative in several ways. The flight from New York to Shannon, Ireland, was my first time on an airplane and my first time out of the country. But far more than that, it was my first time experiencing the cultures of my origins and an even then (!) post-Christian spiritual world predictive of what lay ahead for our own.

Seven whirl-wind weeks of plane flights, bus trips, nightly concerts, and delightful over-nights with diverse families in ten countries proved transformative in my understanding of how and where God was at work in the world beyond the one I'd known for 18 years. The intense interpersonal relationships that developed among the 44 men who shared that tour imprinted the importance of a mutual spiritual journey as a life pattern for the ensuing 60 years. Clayton Halvorsen's high musical standards and example of personal integrity were equally formative in my future choices and involvements. As a chemistry major, I felt privileged to experience an epic musical venture that nurtured a life-long thirst to maintain choral singing as a vital avocation. The overseas travel itself gave birth to decades of a desire to grow my worldview with similar trips exploring aspects of music, medicine and education beyond that of the country I grew up in.

Clearly, the trajectory of my life was altered in many positive ways by that 1963 tour. Its impact is still resonating in my daily life. And reflecting on that with the May 2023 gathering 60 years later confirms its value!

THE OMA RECURRING GIVING CAMPAIGN

When the Old Man Association was established in 2016, its mission was to “support the Wheaton College Men’s Glee Club and to glorify Christ and His Kingdom.” Seven years later, I am very proud of the work our Old Men have done in pursuit of this vision. In a few short years, the OMA has commissioned exclusive music, published its digital archive, fundraised for tours, hosted annual receptions at Homecoming and the Home Concert, and created this very newsletter. We’ve accomplished all of this through the dedication of Old Men, financial contributions from the Board, and ad-hoc giving campaigns.

But from the beginning, the OMA has desired to support the Club and its members in its day-to-day rhythms, not just on special occasions. And so this year, the Old Man Association hopes to take another step toward our mission by establishing a general fund through annual giving.

Through the annual, recurring support of Old Men like you, the general fund will be used to support specific objectives that will help the Club support its primary mission of furthering the Gospel of Jesus Christ and pursuing a whole-hearted community of Old Men, mentoring and serving one another in brotherhood, including:

- 1. Creating a scholarship to accompany the Four-Year-Man Award: The FYM award is presented to the rising senior who best lives out truth, integrity, and brotherhood as voted by the MGC. This scholarship aims to honor the recipient’s outstanding commitment to the Club and was a founding goal of the OMA.*
- 2. Defraying the Glee Club course fee. Each member of the Club pays \$425 per year in course fees and receives a music credit. This cost can be a heavy deterrent for many Men, especially new recruits and those with limited means. We aim to ease the financial anxieties that could pull any man away from membership in the Club.*
- 3. Assisting with tuxedos, blazers, and other mandatory New Man costs. In their first few weeks of school, New Men are inundated with costs and obligations from within the MGC and without. Hundreds of dollars out of pocket can be unfeasible for these freshmen, forcing them to make a commitment decision after only a few rehearsals.*

Your contributions to the general fund will also support other OMA projects, including MGC retreats, commissioned choral pieces, and Old Man receptions in pursuit of our vision to “help spread the Gospel across the world and build a long-lasting community of Old Men.” We also want you to know exactly how your contributions support the Club’s mission. To that end, there will be an annual report on the collection and disbursement of these funds in the OMA Newsletter.

Please join me and our fellow Old Men in supporting the MGC and OMA through contributions of any amount. While we encourage an annual recurring gift, one-time gifts are certainly welcome. You will be receiving a postcard with contribution details in the coming weeks, but you can also donate at any time using this [link](#).
